Tadashi Shiraishi is Professor of the University of Tokyo Graduate Schools for Law and Politics, in charge of competition law. He taught at Tohoku University, 1991-97, before he joined the University of Tokyo in 1997.

Professor Shiraishi has contributed to, among others, systematic understanding of competition laws. He has published an educational textbook, *An Introduction to the Competition Law of Japan* (7th ed. 2014, Yuhikaku, in Japanese) and a treatise for professionals, *Competition Law of Japan* (3d ed. 2016, Yuhikaku, in Japanese).
